Choose your change!

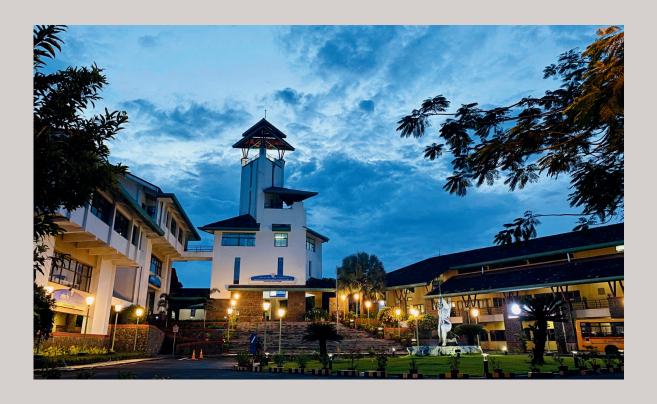

From MBA to PhD: **A Journey Back to** Where It All Began

IIM Kozhikode has always been a part of me. After completing my MBA in 2019, I spent over four years at Aditya Birla Fashion and Retail leading sustainability and digital initiatives across businesses. The corporate world was exciting and full of learning but the desire to go deeper to engage with research and ideas at a different level never left me. When the chance came to return to IIMK for a PhD in Strategic Management, I knew this was where I wanted to be.

The IIMK tag always carried weight. In boardrooms, industry events leadership discussions, it was a mark of trust. opened doors, conversations and brought recognition in ways I hadn't expected. I stayed in touch with my professors often reaching out for their guidance. Their insights continued to shape my thinking long had left campus. connections also led to meaningful



industry academia partnerships impact of bridging reinforcing the research with real-world business challenges. Beyond this IIM Kozhikode's strong alumni network always provided belonging sense of offering professional support and a shared the institute's pride growing reputation.

Walking back in as a PhD scholar I see how much has changed yet how much remains the same. The lush green hilltop the energy of the classrooms the endless intellectual discussions it's all still here. What's different is IIM Kozhikode's rising position. When I did my MBA the institute was ranked around 5 or 6. Today it stands at number 3. Watching this growth from the outside was a proud moment but being back here to experience it firsthand is something else entirely.

I had been a part of servicebased organizations since the started with my corporate career. Being the only child of my parents, I had stepped out of my home for the very first time after joining Mysore and Infosys susceptible to facing challenges or failures in life. While Infosys Mysore taught me ways to live independently, I had an aim for pursuing higher education later on. 5 years later, IIM Kozhikode was the place I landed at and life took a turn from there. It was altogether a separate feeling of getting the admission offer letter, the experience of sitting in the classrooms of one of the most prestigious institutions in seeing the country, the campus and experiencing it all in 2 years.

Operations was my major during the degree course and I started growing attention towards the subject wanting to know more about it, not sure when I started diving more into the Amazon case studies and wanting to see the processes taking place in the heart of field of operations. That was the start point of aiming, progressing and determining the destination. Getting a role change was difficult at that point of time, we belonged to the Covid batch year and I was aiming for a transition to a productbased org after spending 9 years in the service-based cluster. All I knew was, the determination and efforts were strong but the waiting time was high. More than a year later, multiple interview calls/

rejections and many more rounds of interviews later, I joined Amazon in the desired role and hence, technically reaching the destination I had aimed for. I landed at the place I had dreamt of - in the heart of operations, inside the world of operations. I was standing there live witnessing the case studies I had read in the books.

The path was rough with a lot challenges and technicalities and jargons to be learnt from the scratch and encountering a huge set of transition from the services mindset window to a productbased one, but the learnings were immense over the yearstoo immense to even pen down. It changed me professionally as a person, changed my outlook viewing and perceiving things and getting to learn and experience a lot of things over the years, learnings which I would carry with me for the rest of my professional career.

The only message that I would want to pass on to 'Komrades' who are yet graduate, nothing impossible if the determination is severe and efforts are alltime high. Keep the focus in place, be determined if you are aiming for a goal and be honest in providing the efforts towards it. Trust me, everything is possible and you are surely capable of it. Lastly, no job is worth your mental peace or health. Dreams, determination and goals are always precious, but keep your health first, their priority order is irreplaceable.

the biggest misconceptions in the corporate world is that sales is a department, a job function, or a career path. In reality, everything is sales-and the we sooner embrace this mindset, the better we become as professionals and leaders.

Even legendary leaders have been salespeople at their core. Steve Jobs didn't just create great products—he sold a vision. Elon Musk doesn't just build companies—he sells the future. Closer home, in everyday corporate life, the best managers are those who sell a compelling career path to their team, ensuring loyalty and motivation.

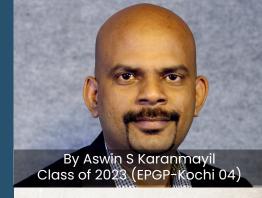


The decision to pursue an Executive MBA IIM Kozhikode's Kochi campus was more than just a career move -it was a test of endurance. With 18 years of work experience, I stepped into the weekend batch, ready for the grind. But nothing quite prepares you for the balancing act of managing work, family, personal commitments, and the relentless academic rigor of an IIM program.

the beginning, I was determined to excel. attended every class. devoured textbooks, and committed to early morning study marathons-often waking up at 3 AM to revise notes and prepare for exams.

My past as a state rank holder had ingrained in me a deep desire to achieve top grades, if not the gold medal. But after a few exams, reality hit hard. The exhaustion was overwhelming, and unlike my student days, I now had a full-time job and a family that needed me. Something had to change.

I shifted my strategy. Instead of burning the midnight oil, I focused on three key things: previewing topics before class, fully present engaged during lectures, and taking the lead in assignments and projects. I let go of self-study, extensive long revision hours, and endless reference materials. Instead, I absorbed knowledge actively in class, worked on assignments with full dedication, and leaned into my work experience to enrich discussions and projects.



On exam days, rather than cramming, I reviewed key concepts and jargon, relying on the solid foundation I had built through lectures and practical work.

This approach not only saved time but also helped me secure top grades in most subjects. Finance, admittedly, wasn't my strongest suit, but in many courses, I scored A grades and became a soughtafter team member for projects. My presentations stood out, and my professors and peers recognized my contributions.

One of my proudest moments was when Dr. Priya Nair Rajeev, my professor, told me she felt blessed to have a student like me—not for my grades, but for my engagement and commitment to learning. That validation meant more than any CGPA ever could.

To all current and future Executive MBA participants juggling careers and families: don't chase perfection through sleepless nights exhaustive study routines. Instead, immerse yourself in classes, engage deeply in assignments, and make learning an active, shared experience.

Many organizations talk about "frugality" as one of their core values. It is one of Amazon's famous leadership principles. It is a handy value to have - not just in corporate but also in life. It might come easy (not generalising here) to a person with a typical Indian middle class "mindset" (note that I don't say middle class "background" because people's mindset is not the same as the background they come from).

Recently, there were a few discussions at my office around this term which got me thinking what really is frugality? How does one go about being "frugal" in a corporate setting?

There is one aspect of frugality that is not spoken about much. That's what I'll address in this blog and I'll bank on my learnings over the last 10 years in corporate life.

Cool, so back to the definition. Frugality refers to the careful management of resources whether it is money, effort or food. There is an emphasis on "saving" and achieving more with less. The Indian "jugaad" mindset lends itself to frugality where you try to be resourceful with whatever you have.

This generally leads people to move towards being conservative. We're frugal - so we don't spend money. We're happy with what we have. We go for options that are cheaper to save money.

This brings forward a legitimate risk. A risk of stagnation, of foregoing growth and learning. You may be doing great with the existing resources but are you really maximising your potential? Are you compromising quality? A question worth pondering over.

So, how do you break out of this risk? Cut to 2015 - I had just joined a brand whose name I hadn't heard of before, Sephora (yes, the multinational speciality beauty retailer). I was the third person to join the team and was working directly with the CEO. My job was business planning and analytics - I was supposed to be the numbers guy. I assumed there would be a lot more people joining in different departments. After a couple of weeks, I realised that it was going to be just 4-5 of us in the corporate team and the rest were in retail. This was my CEO's way of being frugal do not grow the size of the team first, let the business demand the manpower once it scales.

It was a lot to take in. I had zero experience in the beauty industry, hardly any corporate experience. I definitely did not have the technical knowledge required to put this frugality into practice. My colleague in category management had a wealth of knowledge about this category and business levers. That was all we had and I felt it was impossible to run a team with such few people. This couldn't be frugality - it was being cheap.

I was naive at the time and I couldn't see one major factor that would come into play. LEARNING. Everyone in the small team was hungry to learn and make a difference. Each of us figured out a way to play multiple roles without burning ourselves out. And within 7-8 months, we had come up with our own innovative systems and set up all the business functions like supply chain, buying, inventory planning and marketing. It took an entire two years before we brought in one set of assistant managers to take over the daily operations.

That experience really opened up my eyes. We see plenty of examples of companies throwing money and people at problems. It may not always work. And almost always, it is not a sustainable strategy. The answer in most situations is upskilling.

Let's break this down a bit more to make it actionable to you - the reader! If you're a company or individual trying to achieve frugality, ask yourself the question - are you continuously focusing on learning new skills? As you keep learning, two things will happen:

- You will figure out quicker ways to do the same tasks. Result = time saved!
- You will also start thinking from a larger context and prioritise better. Result = time and money is spent on higher Rol tasks.

Next question that you need to ask is this what do I need to learn to be able to 2x my output? Is it something technical? Is it the mastery of some tools? It could even getting more comfortable with Excel! Or learning people management - managing them upwards, sideways and downwards in the hierarchy. Getting this answer will help you move faster without ambiguity.

Here's an example. We had over 5000 SKUs at Sephora and we needed to figure out the ideal weekly stock allocation from our warehouse to the stores. It worked out fine when we had 4 stores - it could be done manually on an Excel sheet. As the store count increased, it became more complex and the chance of errors went up. There were multiple files to bring together for each SKU - one wrong filter or copy paste error would throw the entire thing off - 3-4 hours of total effort wasted.

After doing this for a couple of months, I realised that if this logic could be automated, the errors would be reduced to zero. And I started learning VBA Macros for Excel. With a couple of weeks of effort, I created templates that could fetch all the required input files, compute the stock allocation and generate the STO files which had to be uploaded on SAP. No more copy paste errors. No more filter errors. It was essentially the job of a full time executive that was handled by the automation. All done in less than 30 minutes!

The best part was that it needed only one minor tweak to accommodate new SKUs and new stores. The format worked beautifully for the next 5-6 years. Frugality achieved! The best part was that we could use the free time to think about improving the assortment, focus on other processes etc.

Here's another quick example outside of work. Frugality is when you constantly upskill, get a better job with a higher salary while not constantly upgrading your lifestyle. If your rate of spending money stays constant while your earning grows, that is another form of frugality. I'm sure I'll get a lot of contenders on this point - always up for a debate in the comments section!

So, the next time you hear the term frugality, think about what skills need to be learned to achieve it!

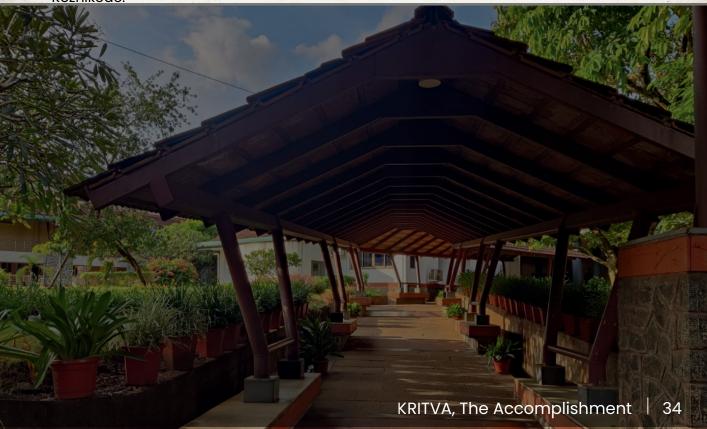

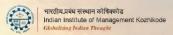

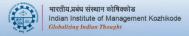
